Project Narrative

Brief Description of the Project
(350 characters or less)

The City of Oxford plans to create a walking trail which will be located within the newly opened Choccolocco Park. The proposed project will provide residents and visitors a 3.2 mile walking trail along the west side of the park that will also be linked to the proposed canoe trail, and the outdoor classroom / amphitheater area.

1. Describe the degree to which the project's scope and feasibility meet the project area's recreational needs. (Key Consideration: Does the project appear to be feasible and incorporate a good project design with consideration given to the natural and cultural environment in which the project is located, and appropriate consideration given to needs and benefits?) 10 Points Available

Limit 1,000 Characters

The project feasibility is great as the City of Oxford owns the property for the proposed outdoor classroom and educational trail. The areas will be on the City's property, and the city has agreed to partner with the Conservation District to create the project. The City will maintain the areas as they will be a part of Choccolocco Park. The plans are to create an outdoor classroom area and interpretive signage along the trails. The project will incorporate informational kiosks, and educational signage highlighting safety information and significant historical and conservation information.

2. Describe the ways in which the project provides for the greatest number of compatible recreational purposes. (Key Consideration: An important concern is that this project will enhance the quality and quantity of recreational trail opportunities available in the community or region. Maximum points will be given to projects with connectivity to other trails or parks, environmental education and preservation, and economic development opportunities.) 10 Points Available

Limit 1,000 Characters

The educational component at Choccolocco Park will provide residents and visitors access to park amenities including picnic pavilions, playgrounds, multi-purpose buildings, outdoor environmental education, and the Veterans Memorial. The outdoor classroom will provide the community with active and passive recreational opportunities offered by the trail corridor thereby promoting physical and emotional wellbeing.

3. Describe the ways in which the project provides a new, unique, or more effective means for making trail opportunities available to the public. (Key Consideration: This criterion includes projects of national, regional, and local demonstration value. The most important concern is whether the grant recipient is committed to trying an approach that is new at the local level. Additional points are awarded for nationwide applicability and statewide or regional value. The applicant must commit to documenting the results of the demonstration.) 10 Points Available

Limit 1,000 Characters

The proposed educational trail will encompass an outdoor classroom / amphitheater area, interpretive signage along the park walking trail, and an informational trail head. The outdoor classroom area will host school groups, the Parks and Recreation Department summer camp students, "Classroom in the Forest", Water Festivals, and various other events. The Alabama Scenic River trail has agreed to help with educational programs and will partner to teach canoe and kayak safety for adults and children. The project will also work with the City of Oxford to implement interpretive signage along a walking trail in Choccolocco Park regarding the Native American Indians of the Choccolocco Creek area, as well as environmental education about the area. A trail head is planned and will house an informational kiosk regarding all trail activities.

4. Describe the ways in which the project facilitates the access and use of trails by persons with disabilities, older citizens, economically disadvantaged, and other special populations or groups. (Key Consideration: Whether this project will expand recreation opportunities for special populations with recreation deficiencies.) 10 Points Available

Limit 1,000 Characters

The outdoor environmental classroom / amphitheater area will be opened at no charge to the public and will offer area's for guided nature walks, Master Gardeners, 4 H Clubs, Classroom in the Forest, Wildlife Schools, and many other conservation education events. The educational areas will be connected to Choccolocco Park which will offer access to other amenities including the boundless playground which is constructed for physically handicapped adults and children. The Calhoun Conservation District and the Choccolocco Creek Watershed Conservancy have agreed to partner to teach classes on many soil and water topics including but not limited to; Secrets of the Soil, Enviroscape Demonstrations, Macroinvertebrates, etc.

5. Describe the ways in which the project creates opportunities for new partnerships between trail users, private interests, and public agencies within the project area. (Key Consideration: The major concern is that this project is a component of an integrated effort to enhance economic revitalization and community conservation. Maximum points will be given to applicants providing evidence of cooperative efforts with trail user groups and/or multiple public meetings.) 10 Points Available

Limit 1,000 Characters

Chocolocco Park will be hosting many events including but not limited to; soccer, track, baseball, softball, disc golf, and rugby. These patrons and their families will be able to take advantage of the park trails. The outdoor education areas will provide the local community and out of town patrons a variety of activities at Chocolocco Park. These outdoor trails will help citizens to re-connect to nature and the wildlife therein. Coordinated signage and mapping systems will guide users toward the types of experiences they seek. The trails and the education / outreach component should have a significant economic impact for the area. They provide active and passive recreational activities for all ages, thereby improving the quality of life for residents and visitors alike.

6. Describe the ways in which the project uses the grant funds to leverage other public or private investments (in the form of services and materials as well as dollars). (Key Consideration: The major concern is whether actual leveraging is assured or the potential for leveraging is good, outside of any funds committed for the initial grant match. Maximum points will be given for applicants committing double the minimum local match or higher.) 10 Points Available

Limit 1,000 Characters

Chocolocco Park will be hosting many events at the park and the revenues generated will help maintenance for the walking trail, canoe trail, and the outdoor education interpretive trail. The creation of these trails will enhance and expand the recreational opportunities available at the park facility. The City of Oxford is committed to the success of the park and all connected trails and future opportunities.

7. Describe the degree of commitment to continue operation and maintenance of the project. Include an operation and maintenance plan detailing the amount of money needed to operate and maintain the trail after it is completed and identify who will be responsible for the work. (Key Consideration: Whether the grant recipient is willing to commit to continue the maintenance and operation of the project and whether the applicant provides a realistic operation and maintenance plan/budget. Maximum points will be awarded to applicants demonstrating innovative funding measures for trail maintenance.) 10 Points Available

Limit 1,000 Characters

The City of Oxford is committed to the success of the park and all connected trails and future opportunities. The education and outreach programs offered will enhance and expand the recreational opportunities available at the park facility. Choccolocco Park has scheduled many park events, and these events will generate revenue for the city. These revenues will be put back into the park budget for operation and maintenance of all park amenities including all connected trails, and outdoor areas.

8. The degree to which community involvement is addressed: i.e., (A) Project idea originated with trail users or a community group that has substantial knowledge, and (B) The private sector (including individual citizens, community groups, or local business enterprises) has participated in the development of the proposed idea and has made commitments of labor, money, or materials to support proposed implementation. (Key Consideration: The objective is to determine if the project is responding to citizen-identified needs. The priority of the project to users is evidenced by citizen support for the idea. Maximum points will be awarded to applicants demonstrating that the project concept was originally proposed at the grassroots level and, especially, for extensive citizen or private organization involvement in project development and support in project implementation. Maximum points will be awarded to applicants demonstrating extensive involvement and participation from citizens and interest groups during all phases of application development and commitments beyond.) 10 Points Available

Limit 1,000 Characters

The outdoor classroom and associated trails originated with the City of Oxford Parks and Recreation Advisory Board, and the Choccolocco Park Committee. The citizens on the advisory board suggested the creation of the trails and met with the park committee to help guide the process for the enhancement and expansion for the trails. The Parks and Recreation Department and advisory board has partnered with the Calhoun Conservation District and the Choccolocco Creek Watershed Conservancy on other projects and the educational component fit perfectly with the goals and objectives of the project.

9. Describe in detail how the trail will be managed. Include discussion on season length, hours of operation, limitations on use, enforcement provisions, and scheduling. 10 Points Available

Limit 1,000 Characters

The outdoor classroom will be operated and managed as a part of the Parks and Recreation Department. The maintenance for the education areas will include the grounds maintenance, and the up-keep and repair of the all educational areas. All associated costs will be included in the Choccolocco Park Budget. The hours of operation will be from 5:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m., which will be the designated parks hours.

10. Identify and describe the service area of the project. Approximately how many people do you propose to serve with this project? Identify other trail resources in the service area by trail type (motorized, non-motorized, multi-use), distance, location in relation to the proposed trail, and ownership. (Key Consideration: The RTP was created to address trail needs in the urban and rural areas of the state. In order to assess the need for additional trails it is first necessary to identify the quantity and location of existing resources within the service area. It is also necessary to establish a service area – either population or resource based. For example, a population based service area could be a neighborhood, school district, or political jurisdiction whereas, a resource based service area might be defined along a linear greenway, water course, or unique natural/cultural area. However, in both instances, an estimate of the number of beneficiaries should be provided.) 10 Points Available

Limit 1,000 Characters

There are currently no public outdoor classroom areas within a 40 miles radius. This outdoor recreation area will also be connected to a planned canoe trail, and walking trail. All educational components will be connected to other park amenities, and the project will cover approximately 43,786 households in the Oxford and Anniston area, while the county has approximately 116,000 in population.

11. Identify the length of time the trail will be maintained and open and available to the public and identify the method to be used to ensure this commitment (deed covenant, deed restriction, etc.). (Key Consideration: The objective is to utilize RTP funds to the greatest extent possible by ensuring the improvements are maintained and available for public trail use as long as possible. Points will only be awarded to applicants exceeding the minimum required timeframe for a trail development project to remain open to the public. Maximum points will be awarded to applicants electing to maintain the improvements in perpetuity.) 15 Points Available

Limit 1,000 Characters

The City of Oxford plans to maintain all trails and education areas in perpetuity as it will be connected to Choccolocco Park. The west side of the park is in a restricted conservation easement and will remain as green-space in perpetuity. Permanently preserving this floodplain as green-space can provide a number of benefits: improve floodplain connectivity, provide flood storage that can lessen future flood impacts, reduce non-point source pollution, provide compatible recreational opportunities, provide wildlife habitat, preserve stream base flow during drought times, and educate the community on the importance of floodplain management.

Note: Property acquired with RTP funds must remain open to the public in perpetuity. Should the property cease to be open to the public for trail use, the applicant must repay the RTP 80% of the fair market value of the property at the time of the change in use. If the project is located on an easement or on leased land, the minimum timeframe for the easement or lease is 25 years. The project must remain open for public access for the use for which the RTP funds were intended during that time. For development projects on applicant owned property, the project must remain open for public access for the use for which the RTP funds were intended for a minimum of 25 years.

Program Information

Introduction

History and Purpose

The Recreational Trails Program (RTP) is a federal grant program authorized by Congress for the purpose of providing states, local governments, and private sector organizations with funds to acquire lands and develop and/or improve trail and trail-related resources.

Allocation of Funds for the 2016 Funding Cycle

The RTP funds are appropriated by Congress to the U. S. Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), and FHWA allocates the funds through state agencies as a grants program to sub-grantees. Alabama's allocation to sub-grantees in the 2016 funding cycle will be approximately \$1,609,000.

Division of Available Funds

The maximum grant amount by trail type is \$35,000 for non-motorized, single-use trails; \$100,000 for non-motorized, diverse-use trails; \$524,936 for motorized trails, or \$87,489 for education.

Thirty percent of Alabama's RTP funds must be used for motorized trail uses, 30 percent for non-motorized trail uses, and 40 percent for diverse trail uses. Diverse motorized projects (such as ATV and motorcycle) or diverse non-motorized projects (such as pedestrian and equestrian) may satisfy two of these categories at the same time. The State encourages applicants to consider projects that benefit both motorized and non-motorized users, such as common trailhead facilities.

Proposed Project Activity

The purpose of the Calhoun County Soil and Water Conservation District's grant proposal is to help provide outdoor recreational opportunities while also providing educational outreach opportunities for area residents surrounding communities, and out of town patrons visiting the area.

The goal of the program will be to create outdoor classroom areas which will be connected to the west side of the newly opened Choccolocco Park, and the planned walking and canoe trails.

The creation of the outdoor classroom component will increase the active and passive recreational opportunities offered by the surrounding trail corridor thereby promoting physical and emotional wellness.

The education project will provide a unique outdoors opportunity, while also increasing public awareness about the value of our natural resources and build a greater constituency for conservation issues.

The program is requesting \$75,394.00 from the Recreation Trails Program to cover expenses associated with the development of the outdoor classroom areas, and educational material to be distributed. A breakdown of the planned expenses can be found in Table 1- Summary of Project Costs (pg 5)

Executive Summary of Proposed Activity

Proposed Project Activity

The purpose of the Calhoun County Soil and Water Conservation District's grant proposal is to help provide outdoor recreational opportunities while also providing educational outreach opportunities for area residents surrounding communities, and out of town patrons visiting the area.

The goal of the program will be to create outdoor classroom areas which will be connected to the west side of the newly opened Choccolocco Park, and the planned walking and canoe trails.

The creation of the outdoor classroom component will increase the active and passive recreational opportunities offered by the surrounding trail corridor thereby promoting physical and emotional wellness.

The education project will provide a unique outdoors opportunity, while also increasing public awareness about the value of our natural resources and build a greater constituency for conservation issues.

The program is requesting \$75,392.00 from the Recreation Trails Program to cover expenses associated with the development of the outdoor classroom areas, and educational material to be distributed. A breakdown of the planned expenses can be found in Table 1- Summary of Project Costs (pg 5).

Trail Location - Choccolocco Park

Current Trails in the Area and Outdoor Classroom Location

There is currently only one public outdoor classroom area within a 30 mile radius. This outdoor classroom will also be connected to a planned walking and canoe trail that will also be connected to Choccolocco Park. The area will have access for Classroom in the Forest, Creek Week, Renew Our Rivers, Earth Day at the Park, and many other events planned for the outdoor education areas. The Alabama Scenic River Trail has agreed to help teach canoe and kayak safety at the outdoor education area.

The outdoor classroom will be located on the west side of the newly opened Choccolocco Park in Oxford, AL. Choccolocco Park is located on Leon Smith Parkway which is only one mile south from Exit 188 off of I-20 in Oxford, AL. The trail is located within a half of a mile of The Exchange shopping on Leon Smith Parkway.

Population of Surrounding Areas

The trail project will cover approximately 43,786 households in the Oxford and Anniston area, and 116,763 in Calhoun County.

Proposed Outdoor Education

Partners Included in the Project

The Calhoun County Soil and Water Conservation District, and the City of Oxford have agreed to partner together to establish an outdoor classroom area, and to also to establish an educational trail head, and interpretive signage along area trails.

Regional Area Education and Outreach

Grant funds for the proposed project will provide for safety brochures, educational material, kiosks, and interpretive signage for the outdoor area. The grant funds will also be used to provide residents with educational and safety workshops and informational rack cards regarding the trails, the hours of operation, and special events planned for the park and trails.

The partners plan to host education and outreach program days which will be scheduled during strategic events in the regional area to include but not limited to summer day camps, *Earth Day* events, *Renew Our Rivers* clean-ups, and *Creek Week*.

The events will also incorporate the Chambers of Commerce, and other area organizations for optimal marketing potential of the events. The events will be posted in the newspaper, and all social media outlets available including websites, Facebook, Twitter, etc.

The Calhoun County Soil and Water District is part of the Community Improvement Committee at the Chamber of Commerce where they partner to host three community clean-up events each year. The district helps sponsor these events and will work to incorporate the outdoor classroom areas into all events.

The Conservation District also participates in *Classroom in the Forest*, (partnering with Alabama Forestry Commission, Alabama Treasured Forest Association, and the Alabama Cooperative Extension System) and the outdoor classrooms and interpretive signage along the trails would be incorporated into

this program. (*The Partner Commitment letters from the Soil and Water Conservation Districts, City of Oxford Parks and Recreation, and City of Anniston are found in Appendix E*).

The districts participate in **Worlds of Work Career Expo** for all 8th graders in Calhoun, Cleburne, and Talladega counties where approximately 2,000 students visit the Ag and Conservation World. The outdoor classroom area would be an ideal location for these students.

The outdoor education areas will also accommodate for wheelchairs and be connected to Choccolocco Park which will be incorporating a boundless playground for the physically impaired.

Educational Project Goals

The program will set an initial goal of contacting 500 per special event and hosting quarterly safety and conservation education and awareness.

Program Activity Reports

All invoices and documents regarding the project milestones will be maintained according to all reporting requirements.





LOCATION MAP




